It is good to meet again in church for the Remembrance Service, after a Covid break last year. It is a time both to look back and to look forward. Forwards, we can pray for a better life for all in this country and the whole world, where plenty of dangers and difficulties surround us: the environment and climate, contests for political and commercial power,

and improving health worldwide are obvious examples.

Looking back, we commemorate, and give heartfelt thanks for, those from Britain and its allies who died or were wounded, whether physically or psychologically, in the two World Wars and many other recent wars and campaigns, including what was in effect a small civil war in Northern Ireland. Without their sacrifices and their bravery, we could not be in the relatively blessed state that we are now.

At the same time we must keep in mind that the sacrifices were not confined to those in uniform, nor only to those on our side in the conflicts. Civilian populations suffered terribly, especially in the Second War: think of Coventry, London, Stalingrad, or the pictures of Berlin in 1945, or the concentration camps.

We should commemorate too the civil defence teams who had to clear up the mess from the bombing, and

pull survivors and corpses from the rubble. It was dangerous work too. The teams often included conscientious objectors, such as a friend of mine who was on duty in central London through the War. It is not surprising he had objections. He had lost his father and three uncles in and around the First War: the four boys of one Lincolnshire family. What a burden.

And we remember the many, many people on the other side who signed up as full of patriotic responsibility as any of our people. Here in church today is a grandchild of a man who volunteered in his mid-30s in Munich, Germany in August 1914, and was killed two months later.

So we thank God for the men from Culworth listed on the plaques, and with them their comrades in this country and across the world, and their one-time opponents. We pray for them, and for their families and descendants. We pray for peace. It is not easy to achieve, as those who died found out. But praying for peace has been a key part of the Anglican tradition for over 500 years.

And we give thanks for all who died in the battles to achieve it.



Birthday, Deaths and Marriages

Martin Rowling

Martin celebrated his 80th birthday in October. He also celebrated 50 years as a church warden and probably 50 years as a parish councillor and member of the village hall committee. To commemorate these two events, Mattins on 17th October was rather special. Fiori Musicali choir came to sing and there were also several tributes from Stuart Rolt, Julie Tinn and Gerald Cadogan. The following Sunday a brass plaque was unveiled in

the

church to commemorate Martin's 50 years as a church warden.

This is Martin's profile he wrote for the parish council website.

I moved to Culworth in 1969 and was joint owner of Culworth Engineering until 2007. I am involved with the Church and usually participate in village activities. On the Parish Council I am responsible for the Annual Litter Pick, maintenance of village trees without Tree Preservation Orders, and generally attend to the repairs of village property Talk about an understatement!

But how do you begin to describe Martin to anyone? Martin the Blacksmith

Martin the churchwarden

Martin the singer, musician, bell ringer

Martin the designer, creator, draughtsman, inventor

Martin the expert on Clocks

Martin the chap from Culworth

Martin is an Essex boy, went to school in Worcester where he was a chorister and where I suspect his love of singing and church music started.

After Writtle college, an Agricultural college in Essex, he embarked on a career in agriculture.

Martin came to Northamptonshire after seeing an

Martin came to Northamptonshire after seeing an advert for a farm position at Canons Ashby. After that he appears to have decided that he wasn't cut out to be a farmer and so changed tack and decided to become a blacksmith.

He subsequently bought the Forge and the site that was to become Culworth Engineering, with Tony Grice, in 1969. And it is Culworth where he has made his home for the last 52 years.

Martin the Blacksmith

Underneath the spreading chestnut tree (still there) you would have found Martin shoeing horses for many years. The huge pile of horseshoes outside are testament to the thousands of horses shod in that time.

The forge is still a living, working forge, unlike the converted forges of other villages. I don't think a week goes by without the fire being lit for some wizardry with iron about to happen. The village is full of Martin's amazing work —in the church you can see the handrails, the doors built to keep the birds out and the air circulating, the gates at the side of the churchyard, rose arbours, estate gates, are all testament to his skills as a blacksmith that will last for many generations.

Martin the Churchwarden

50 years is a long time. The churchwardens at the beginning of the 20_{th} century are remembered in the stained glass window in the north aisle, and they were only churchwardens for 27years! Martin has maintained this church for 50 years. Other churches have to pay a maintenance fee – we have Martin. He has maintained our clock and bells (plus those of many other local churches.) How lucky Culworth church has been.

He has been treasurer of the PCC for as many years. He likes to do things in the old fashioned way.

Not for him a computer or spread sheet. He has a leather ledger embossed with Culworth Church in gold lettering on the front, in which the accounts are all beautifully written in copper plate writing.

Martin the musician, singer, bell ringer.

Martin was a chorister in Worcester. He has a deep, resonant bass voice. Now singing in the Fiori

Musicali choir, he has a love of choral music including all the great oratorios. For many years he played a key role in the Banbury Choral Society and has also been known to help out in many local choral events.

Bell ringing. Think this must have started in his youth in Essex but once he arrived in Culworth he saw bell ringing as a good way to socialise. Since then Martin has provided not only bell ringing expertise but help to many local towers when bells and clocks have needed repair etc. He is also current chairman of the local branch of bell ringers. Martin the designer, creator, draughtsman and inventor

As you all know, Martin does not do modern technology – he hasn't a clue about mobile phones, texting, facebook, digital controls, computers, in fact anything that has been invented in the last 100 years. So what Martin does is based on those of a skilled craftsman. All this ability came to fruition in the building of THE clock on the east wall of the forge. This 7 year project was built using only techniques used by blacksmiths 250 years ago, using only tools used by blacksmiths 250 years ago. It is thought to be the only clock in Britain featuring a 6 hour dial. Martin even used wooden poles tied with leather straps as scaffolding so even that was authentic.

The road to this achievement, which is now in the latest Pevsner edition for Northamptonshire, will soon be available for all to read, as Martin the author, is about to have a book published.

Martin is also an expert on clocks. He has lead tours for clock enthusiasts and their spouses all around the country.

Holidays for him and Jose are a bit of an anathema. When they can be persuaded to leave Culworth for a few days, their holidays are not like ours, sitting in the sunshine somewhere relaxing, reading a book, going for a swim or a paddle; they visit Victorian monuments to steam and the industrial age. They have probably visited every cathedral in the kingdom and everywhere where there are amazing clocks. They would prefer to travel by train, even better if the train is pulled by steam, with Martin carrying of course, not the Bradshaw's of Michael Portillo, but the relevant Pevsner Guide and Ordnance Survey maps.

A Year on the farm

Last year's harvest is now over and the winter jobs are beginning. For farmers the different seasons can be very challenging in different ways.

Autumn 2020

On the arable side of the farm we had the muck spread on the stubble, the hedges were trimmed back and some of the ground was ploughed before it became very wet as some of our fields are on heavy ground.

On the animal side we wean the lambs from the ewes and the calves from the cows as they are old enough to look after themselves. The lambs get put in a different field from the ewes to get fat so they can be sold but the claves get put in the shed to also get fat to be sold.

This time of year on the arable side it is quite quiet and not much going on apart from controlling pests because of the bad weather and coldness.

But on the animal side it is very busy because it is the time of year when the vet comes to check each cow for tuberculosis. Also the ram gets put out with the ewes to get them into lamb.

Spring 2021

We start to drill the land and after its been a few weeks we can spray and fertilise. On the farm.we also roll and harrow the grass and fertilise it so it starts to grow for the animals and haymaking.

Overall these two months are the busiest as we are lambing and some of the cows who have already been with the bull nine months start to calve in the buildings and the rest get put out in the field.

Due to covid I was home schooling which meant I could help with lambing and in my PE lesson could ride the ponies.

Summer 2021

Haymaking and combining starts. Luckily we got it all done in the nice weather before the rain started. All the hay and straw that has been made will be used for bedding and food in the winter for the cattle and horses.
