Litter pick

Saturday March 2nd 2019 10am starting at The Forge

For a number of years we have had a litter pick on the first Saturday in March. Last year there was a significant covering of snow making it impossible to see the litter. The litter pick was cancelled. Hence this year there is two years accumulation to pick up and from my observations there is quite a lot.

If you would like to take part in this exercise to keep the village tidy, please come along. It is better to work in pairs so bring a friend or you may be given a partner. It wouldn't be necessary to pick up litter if it hadn't been deposited in the first place. Some may have been thrown from vehicles.

There are a number of litter bins around the village emptied weekly by SNC. Dog poo bins located at the allotment gate to rear of school, along Concrete road off Banbury Lane, at gate into Recreation Field along concrete road, at entrance to Cricket Field off Banbury Lane, and at Junction of Sulgrave Road and Barley Hill. These too are emptied weekly, paid for by the Parish Council, costing approximately £960 per year.

SNC provide Hi-vis jackets, litter pick sticks, black bags and gloves which I will issue from the Forge. Do let me know if you can help and I look forward to a good team.

Culworth Hill Field Trust Update February 2019

Thank you to villagers who took the time to examine our latest plans for the new recreational facility to replace the existing village hall and cricket pavilion and to attend the public meetings. This was your opportunity to have your say. Progress to date and the latest plans for the new recreational facility were presented at the public meetings by the Culworth Hill Field Trust (CHFT) trustees and the architect Jim Gosling. 27 villagers attended the Thursday public meeting and 18 (including Mrs Trott) attended the Saturday meeting. The latest plans were on display in Forge Coffee and the Church from January 16th until 2nd February. Boxes were provided for residents to leave their written comments. Comments were also received by e-mail. A total of 74 comments were received in all. Peter Keenan, Treasurer, Eydon Community Sports Field, acted as an independent invigilator, who supervised the collection of residents comments including e-mail comments. His report follows after this note. A full list of individual comments, with names removed, will be posted on the website and a hard copy will be available on request.

We are committed to delivering a new building that the village can be proud of and will be well used by Culworth Villagers, present and future. We are endeavouring to design a building that is in keeping with the character of the village, fit for purpose and low cost to operate. As stated in the public meetings the plans presented at the public meeting are still "work in progress" and the design process is ongoing. After consideration of all your comments and suggestions, and in consultation with our advisers, amendments will be made to the plans that are consistent with maximising our chances of getting planning permission and will minimise costs to build and operate the new building.

It is in everybody's interest to increase the number of car parking spaces and to keep the size of the building to a minimum. Discussions are ongoing with SNC Planning officers and representatives from Sport England to address these issues. As explained at the public meetings, once planning permission has been obtained, the next stage is the technical and detailed design of the building. This is when most of your detailed design comments and suggestions will be considered and addressed. Neither the design nor the cost can be firmed up until this process is complete and any appropriate changes that arise as conditions from certain funding sources are accommodated. We are also aware that build costs have increased due to inflation over the last two years and are likely to continue to do so. It is imperative that we get on with this so we can keep costs to a minimum. Our prime focus is to get planning permission in order to be able to take advantage of funding sources whilst they are available, particularly from SNC and HS2. We will then approach other funding sources, and to give you some idea of what is involved in this process, Westbury who raised £850k over two years ago made 55 applications to potential funders out of which 5 actually came up with the money.

Thank you once again for your comments and suggestions. This is a challenging project and we need your continued and enthusiastic support to deliver this exciting new facility for the village. We will keep you updated on progress via the Culworth Newsletter and the website.

To Whom it May Concern

I can confirm that on the above date I undertook an informal independent review of the process behind, and the response to, a consultation exercise for Culworth parish residents regarding their views on plans for a new combined village hall and cricket pavilion.

The objective of the exercise was principally to:

Review the activities that have been undertaken as part of the consultation process Document the above Witness the opening of three comments boxes Review email comment facility Collate comments and provide a high level, subjective summary of their content.

The consultation exercise comprised:

Distribution, on 3 January 2019, to every household within Culworth parish boundary, of an A5 note explaining the process and timescales for consultation. The same note (A4 format) was posted to the village hall noticeboard. Architect drawings of the field plan, village hall / pavilion building plan and village hall / pavilion elevation / artists impression were posted in Culworth church and Forge Coffee shop. Two public meetings were held Comment boxes were placed in Forge Coffee shop, Culworth Church and also at the public meetings. An email account was setup (culworthhillfieldtrust@gmail.com) for capturing online comments. Collation of a list of attendees at the public meetings. The consultation period closed for comments on Saturday 2nd February 2019.

Comment box contents:

Box 1 – Forge Coffee Shop 3 sheets of printed commentary 39 handwritten comment slips Of the 39 handwritten slips, 14 were very positive and enthusiastic of the proposed facility without discussing details issues. None were overtly negative towards the project. The large majority of the remainder of the handwritten slips, plus the 3 printed comment sheets offered questions, suggestions or opinions generally covering the following issues / categories (in no particular order): Emphasis on village hall or cricket pavilion (bias to the latter) Inclusion of a play area Parking Possibility of badminton in hall Heating / running costs / eco issues / ground source and solar Changing rooms and toilet access Hall capacity Location of emergency exits Toilet facilities

Window frontage and protection from cricket balls Size of the building – too big for village needs Cost of the building too great / Parish Council funding Sustainability and ongoing running costs Building design vs function Sianaae Air conditioning Delivery access Online booking Wifi availability Car charging point Projector Interior layout Cycle storage Bin / waste areas

Box 2 – Village Hall This box was empty

Box 3 – Church

This box contained 24 comment slips, (including 3 that had originally been stuck to the outside of the box) and broadly covered the following issues: Parking Building size and cost Toilets Village hall vs cricket pavilion emphasis Security Solar / eco issues for heating and sustainability Noise / light pollution

Email account

8 comments were submitted by email (including one to the parish council email address). Issues raised were largely in line with those above, but more detailed and somewhat less supportive, costs and funding issues were noted several times.

Note - the review did not include documenting verbatim each comment submitted. All comment box slips have been retained and email account comments collated into a word document for inspection if required.

Observations

My subjective summary of the overall picture of comments provided would be:

About 20% of comments were universally and enthusiastically supportive of the project as a whole without offering any detail.

The vast majority of the remainder were of the form of queries, suggestions, ideas for

improvement or "wish lists".

The two most frequently raised issues of concern were very clearly:

Parking – amount of, impact of overflow, access issues etc

Toilets – unisex, locations

There were a (statistically very small) number of strongly expressed comments suggesting that: The facility is too large / not what the village needs / biased towards cricket rather than a village hall Not what was promised or envisaged earlier in the project

Too expensive

Summary

So far as I was able to tell, the consultation process has been well publicised and managed with due propriety.

Flower of the Month Snowdrop

It was classified by Carl Linnaeus in 1753 as Galanthus Nivalis. 'Gala' from Greek means milk, 'anthos' means flower, and 'Nivalis' from Latin means snow. They originate from Europe and Asia Minor.



There are about 20 different species, and over 2000 distinct cultivars . The leaves are usually 6"

long and have enforced tips which ensure successful growth through the snow. They usually flower between January and April.

They contain a natural anti freeze. Even if they collapse in freezing weather, they recover once the temperature rises.

Snowdrops are poisonous, but an extract, called Galantamine, is now used medically to treat Alzheimer's.

They are regarded as symbols of spring, hope and purity.

Some bulbs are so precious that they are kept locked up and guarded.

One bulb " Gallanthus Plicatus" /Golden Fleece was sold for £1,390.

Since 1995 international trade has been banned unless you have a special license,

People who are keen on snowdrops and/or collect them are known as 'Galanthophiles'. Their avid interest/addiction is known as 'Galanthomania'. Nurseryman James Atkins (1804-1884) of Northamptonshire was one of the earliest galanthophiles, and gave his name to Galanthus Atkinsii.

Colesbourne Park in Gloucestershire boasts more than 250 varieties, and is known as "England's greatest snowdrop garden ".

Some galanthophiles equip themselves with a special walking stick with a mirror attached to the base. Thus they can look under the flowers without having to bend over or strain their backs!!

During WW2 the US Military Police were nicknamed 'snowdrops' by British civilians. This was because their olive green uniforms with white cap or helmet and white gloves made them resemble snowdrops. *Tricia Donati*

Minutes of 11th September, 26th September, 9th October were confirmed as correct by all councillors present.

No matters arising not on agenda

Parish meeting 16th October. The Clerk reported that the vote of no confidence in the chair was unsuccessful, with 9 votes in support and 51 against, one abstention and two non voters. Minutes of that meeting were signed at the conclusion by Cllr Lamb dated and timed. The Chair read out the final paragraph of the Monitoring Officer's response to a complaint about the chair, in which the Monitoring Officer stated he had found no breach of the code of conduct by the Chair, but recommended Councillors who hold different positions for different organisations should make it clear when writing and when discussing issues in which capacity they are doing so. This recommendation was noted and accepted by the council.

Cricket Field-Cllr Rolt stated that the Parish Council and Culworth Hill Field Trust had applied to SNC for third preapplication.

Newsletter- Positive response from residents NCC Grit Bins- those at Sulgrave Road and top of Banbury Lane would be maintained by NCC. The remainder will be taken over by Parish Council. Cllr Mumford to list present state of bins. Clerk to check with insurance company any liabilities.

Street Lighting

Western Power had reconnected Light 8 outside church damaged by vandals. Cllr Mumford was delegated authority to find a satisfactory solution to a resident's concerns about street light intrusion into their house, provided this resolution was at no cost to the parish and any change continued to provide satisfactory lighting in the area of the school path.

Blackbird Hill Bridge NCC state that work will commence on 19th November 2018 and last four weeks. Gigaclear may close the road for further two days to complete their work.

Defibrillator checked on 18 October. No problems.

Speed Monitoring and HS2funding. Cllr Rolt to set up meeting with Cllr Mumford and Leadbeater, and to submit application to NCC highways for financial assistance from HS2.

HS2 update. Cllr Rowling reported on meeting 6th November. Drop in day/morning to be arranged locally.

Local Government Reorganisation. – request for name. SouthWest Northamptonshire to be forwarded to SNC.

The Minutes of the last meeting were signed as correct.

Matters Arising: The cleaning products have now been removed to a high cupboard, out of the reach of children and JT has confirmed that a PAT test on the electrical appliances is not obligatory.

Extra Agenda Item; Josie Rowling supplied copies of the proposed plans for the new hall which were viewed by the Committee prior to the public meetings. Thanks go to Jim Gosling for their preparation.

Conflict of Interest: As from now this should be included in the future Agendas. JT declared a conflict of interest.

New Treasurer: SP proposed and MK seconded that Mark Izzett should be elected as the new Treasurer. This was carried unanimously. Chairmans Report: Welcome to MI who will notify the banks, utility companies etc. of the change of details. I have sent a letter to Jane Field thanking her for her support and hard work in her role as treasurer. The last film Children's Act made a profit of £175 and King of Thieves is being shown on 25th January. 8th March has been booked for the next showing but no film has yet been chosen. I contacted BWB (Charity Lawyers), they have applied a Charity Discount to our account so their bill has now been paid. **BWB** Should we get another quote for legal advice? As we have spent time with BWB, met with them and recommended by Acre it was decided to stay with them.

He said he thought we should have pre- app or full plans as then we would be in control. Nick Rudge from Savills has Emailed his interest in representing the Trust in marketing the site. **Update on CHFT project.** Following a pre-app meeting and input from Sport England the plans for the new building will be displayed in the Church and Forge Coffee from 16th January. Public meetings on 24th January and 26th January have been arranged for villagers to comment and ask questions. CHFT has agreed to pay for the Letter of Intent.

Christmas Day Holy Communion 11am saw the church well filled. The tradition of Memorial candles, started by the late Mrs Rosemary Courtney has continued. Over the years, funds raised from these have purchased new door mats alter linen and a generous donation to the clock fund. Candles were lit as people requested and those names read out by Gerald Cadogan at the start of the service which was led by Paul Franklin from Middleton Cheney.

Church Roof Update

You may wonder why nothing appears to have been done to replace the lead stolen from the south aisle last September. Because we have to abide by so many rules we first had to apply to the Diocesan Advisory Committee for a change of roofing. We had hoped they would allow concrete tiles which already cover the Nave roof. This would have been the cheapest option. However they consider this unsatisfactory and suggest we now consider terne-coated stainless steel which is the only other alternative if we do not wish to replace the roof with lead again. We now have to apply for a faculty from the diocese before we can apply for planning permission from South Northants County Council to replace the roof with this material. Nothing can be done quickly. At the moment we have not been able to apply for any quotes since we are not sure what we are allowed to put on the roof. It is frustrating and time consuming. Hopefully when we do have some figures available we will be able to call on the generosity of the village so that the roof can be repaired. The insurance cover for stolen lead from church roofs, does not cover the cost of replacement. In the meantime we are very grateful to Tim Scott who has made the roof watertight with tarpaulin

and is keeping an eye on it to make sure we don't have any more weather related damage done. *Jenny and Martin*

Help needed to mow the churchyard!
